A History of Brighton Monuments



- 1916 Ladies of Brighton gather fieldstones.
- 1919 Brighton's Branch of the Great War Veterans Association raised \$1,088.00. There was a private donation of two parcels of land that became Memorial Park. A simple Fieldstone Monument was constructed.
- 1923 A new monument shape was designed and built by Lt Millar of the Railway Troops.
- 1927 Sir Arthur Currie dedicated the 1923 Cenotaph on September 18, 1927.

Over the years, the cenotaph underwent many iterations, including being 'topped' with a lion's head fountain that depicted courage of the fallen.

- 1938 On Remembrance Day, the lion's head was replaced by a Torch Light symbolizing that the memory of those fallen would shine forever.
- 1948 A plaque was added with the names of those citizens of Brighton who fell in World War II.
- 1953 The Korean War plaque was added.

Sometime after 1980 the torch on the top of the Cenotaph was Taken down and a Cross installed.

On May 23rd a Decommissioning Ceremony of the old Cenotaph and Ground Ground Breaking Ceremony for a new Cenotaph took place.

In June 2012 the old Cenotaph was dismantled


On October 20th a new War and Peace Keeping Memorial was dedicated by Sergeant Stephen Drinkwater, a serving Army NCO and Afghanistan War veteran.

On Remembrance Day, the WWI Battle Honour Monument was dedicated by the Ontario Lieutenant Governor, the Honourable Elizabeth Dowdeswell. The monument proudly displays the WWI Battle Honour Plaques that were removed from the old Cenotaph in June 2012.
